LARGEST CLASS EVER GRADUATED

From Kokomo High School
Will Be That of 1910.

HAS A LONG LEAD

Over Any Preceding Class—Seventy
Students Practically Sure of Di-
plomas—Number May be Increased
to Seventy-Five—Commencement
Falls on Friday, June 2—An Alum-
nus to Deliver Address.

All records for size are to be beaten by the class that is to be graduated at the end of the current term from the Kokomo high school. It is practically certain that the graduates will number seventy, and if certain students buckle down to business and do the work from now on that they are capable of doing, the number may be increased to seventy-five.

Commencement this year falls on Thursday, June 2. The program in general will follow the lines of the one of last year. There will be a salutatory, an address and a valedictory. Musical numbers will intersperse the literary and oratorical offerings and there will be the usual devotional exercises and, at the end, the presentation of diplomas by the superintendent.

The class has decided to follow the precedent set by the class of 1909 in selecting the person to deliver the address. An alumnus was chosen for that service last year, and one will be selected to furnish a like number this year. No announcement has been made as to whom will be chosen, but it is understood the class has several names under consideration, some of them residents of Kokomo and two or three residents of other cities.

The place for holding the commencement has not been selected, but either the Sipe theater or Grace M. E. church will likely be chosen. The theater would be favored were it not doubtful whether all the friends of the graduates could be accommodated there. Because of the extraordinary size of the class the number of persons wishing to attend commencement will be larger than ever before.

The class of 1910 has done excellent work. Nearly all members have made a creditable showing. There are a few laggards, but it is believed most of these will work themselves up to a sufficient number of credits to enable them to be graduated with their class.
