59 Digital Files of Hendricks County Probate Records Added

Thanks to the help of the scanning volunteers at the Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne, we've added 59 more [digitized files](#) of Hendricks County probate records to our website. The newest files cover these surnames:

IGS Database Additions

Among the premium databases that we've added recently is an index to a register of the Monroe County Jail for 1896 through 1905. The index was compiled by Randi Richardson and has over 4,000 entries; the register is archived at the Monroe County History Center in Bloomington.

--From now through April 27th, 2 webinars about researching War of 1812 records are available for free on the [webinars](#) section of the Federation of Genealogical Societies website. The webinars talk about local and state records that were generated at the time of the war, as well as post-war records.

--The effort to [digitize](#) all 180,000 pension files of War of 1812 veterans and put them online for free now has over 1 million documents [online](#).

County Roundup

Here are some genealogical and local history news items from around the state. NOTE: Items on news sites often change or are removed without notice - we apologize if you encounter a link that no longer works.

ALLEN COUNTY

The Allen County Clerk and FamilySearch have announced a partnership to [digitize Allen County's courthouse records](#) from the 1800's. The Allen County Genealogical Society of Indiana is also lending volunteers to the project, which is expected to take 2 years.

DEKALB COUNTY

--The DeKalb County Historical Society now has a [Facebook page](#).
--The Willennar Genealogy Center has [opened a scanning station](#) for the public to digitize its documents for free (by appointment only). Library employees will be on hand to guide you through the process.

MONROE COUNTY

The Monroe County government is in the process of [creating a dedicated archives](#) in Bloomington. The archives allows them to centralize their collection of records books, and they have plans to digitize them.

PARKE COUNTY

The Rockville Public Library has [renamed its genealogy collection](#) in honor of a Parke County resident who died last summer. Alberta T. Butler was a member of the Wabash Valley Genealogy Society and Parke County Historical Society, in addition to being the Indiana County Genealogist for Parke County.

Research Tip: Indiana's Congressional Districts

To determine representation in the U.S. House of Representatives, Indiana was divided into numbered Congressional districts (NOTE: These districts are not the same as the districts that were used to determine representation in the Indiana House of Representatives). Over time, the population grew and shifted. As a result, more Congressional districts were added, and the boundaries of existing Congressional districts were changed - for example, in the 1911 redistricting, Indiana's 7th District consisted only of Marion County.

The annual report of Indiana's Secretary of State for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1916 listed Indiana's Congressional districts by county for the redistricting that was done in 1821, 1831, 1833, 1842, 1852, 1867, 1872, 1879, 1885, 1891, 1895, 1901 and 1911. We have put this listing into an easier-to-read [table](#) (PDF format).

Knowing what Congressional district an Indiana county was in at a particular time can be helpful in your research, particularly when it comes to federal records. The Civil War draft registration of 1863 and the Internal Revenue Service income tax lists that began in the 1860's are among the records that are grouped by Congressional district.

Tribute to Allen County Public Library's Director

If you have had the joy of experiencing the collection of the Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne - either online or in person - it is in part because of the efforts of Jeffrey Krull. The library's longtime director [announced](#) he will be retiring this fall, and an article celebrated his many accomplishments, including supporting the growth of their Genealogy Center.

Schoolhouses Condemned (1903)

Inspectors from the Indiana State Board of Health visited several schoolhouses in the spring of 1903 and ordered them to be demolished because of their condition:

- Marion County - Bridgeport, Wayne Township. The brick walls of

School #15 were crumbling because of rain and the blackboards were chipped. The halls were very narrow - "It is evident, in case of fire, that all of the children would probably not be able to escape."

- Monroe County - Stinesville, Bean Blossom Township. The walls were cracked and there was no water supply - when students were thirsty, they had to go to one of the neighboring homes.
- Orange County - West Baden. School #8 was a fire hazard, had floors full of mud and the outhouses were "too awful to describe." The area around the school was also lambasted for its dirtiness, with gutters clogged with tin cans and other debris.
- Washington County - Campbellsburg. Students frequently got eyestrain and headaches because of having to look into sunlight. The heating was so poor there was a 20 degree difference in temperature between the floor and the desks, causing some students to get frostbite. The noise from a nearby sawmill made it almost impossible for the teachers to hear the students speak.
- Washington County - Smedley, Vernon Township. Built very poorly in 1890, it had 70 children, who had to fit 3 to a seat, and there were holes in the ceiling and floors.

UPDATE: Agricultural & Manufacturing Censuses



In our April 2013 issue, we talked about the importance of non-population censuses, specifically the agricultural and manufacturing censuses that were taken at the same time as the federal census in 1850, 1860, 1870 & 1880. They provide great details about farms and businesses, including how many people they employed and how much they produced.

These censuses are not as widely available as the population censuses, but our Members-Only area includes indexes of the agricultural and manufacturing censuses

for several counties in southeastern Indiana.

In February FamilySearch added [digital images](#) of the agricultural and manufacturing censuses for counties in Illinois. Even if your ancestors were not in Illinois, looking at these images can give you an idea of the kinds of information you can expect to find in these censuses.

Help with Reading Old Handwriting

The National Archives of the UK has an online tutorial, [Palaeography: Reading Old Handwriting 1500-1800](#), which includes tips on how to read and transcribe old handwritten documents.

Legal Terms Explained: Lis Pendens

Lis pendens is a Latin phrase meaning "suit pending". In more modern times, it has been used when there is a lawsuit regarding a piece of real estate, such as foreclosure proceedings. A public notice of "lis pendens" is sometimes required to be published so that potential buyers will be aware there is a lawsuit involving that piece of real estate.

Help with Reading Documents in Latin

Have you run across Latin words in your genealogy research? In addition to English records from the 1700's, many American court records and Catholic church records used Latin terms through the 1900's. The National Archives of the UK has an online tutorial, [Beginners' Latin](#), which includes some grammar tips and a list of common Latin words.

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
