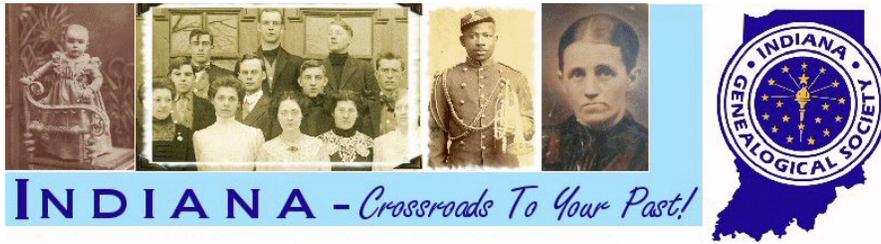

Funding for new Indiana State Archives in jeopardy

When the Indiana legislature finally approved \$25 million in spring 2015 for a new building for the Indiana State Archives, the funding was dependent on the state reaching a deal to lease the cell-phone towers it owns. Last fall, the cell-phone tower deal fell through, and now the funding must be made through the budget that the legislature is now crafting.

The current building on East 30th Street in Indianapolis is a modified warehouse, which the Archives "temporarily" moved into way back in 2001.

The conditions continue to deteriorate. The Friends of the Indiana State Archives (FISA) report that just since January 1st, there have been 5 leaks in the current building on East 30th Street - including one in the vault that holds the state's 1816 constitution and other treasures.

IGS Seminar on Digitizing Records

The Indiana Genealogical Society will hold a [Society Management Seminar](#) on **Friday, April 7** at the [Indiana Historical Society](#) in Indianapolis, as the lead-up to our conference. Our seminar always focuses on topics that help those involved in the operation of local genealogy organizations, such as societies and libraries. This year's seminar will focus on how to digitize records:

- Connie Rendfeld, the Digital Initiatives Librarian for the Indiana State Library, will talk about how to plan your digitization project before you start scanning
- Ramona Duncan-Huse and Susan Sutton from the Indiana Historical Society will talk about how to preserve records and how to choose what you should put online
- Ron Darrah from the Genealogical Society of Marion County will lead a panel discussion on local digitization projects
- Tours will be given of the Indiana Historical Society's Conservation Lab and their William H. Smith Memorial Library



Free parking will be available in the IHS parking lot (enter on New York Street) and the IHS Stardust Café on the canal level will be open for lunch. The seminar costs just \$5 per person. Register [online](#) or mail in the registration form along with your payment.

- **North Central District Director** - represents Carroll, Cass, Elkhart, Fulton, Howard, Kosciusko, Marshall, Miami, St. Joseph and Wabash counties.
- **Northeast District Director** - represents Adams, Allen, Blackford, DeKalb, Grant, Huntington, Jay, LaGrange, Noble, Steuben, Wells and Whitley counties.
- **Recording Secretary** - takes minutes at the board meetings and then e-mails them to the board for any corrections.

These positions report at the board meetings, which are held quarterly, usually at a site in central Indiana. Mileage is reimbursed.

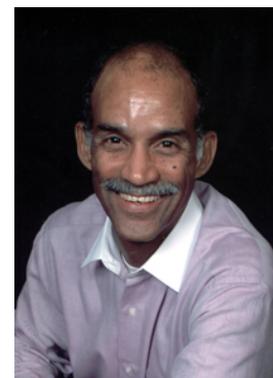

Deadline to register for IGS conference in Indianapolis

Indiana Genealogical Society members will receive a \$10 discount on the conference if they pre-register.

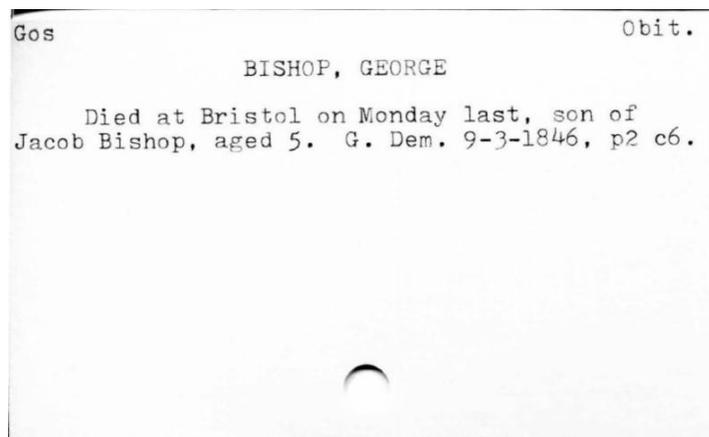

Free databases from IGS scanning kits added

Here are some of the databases we've added recently from our [Indiana Genealogy Digitization Project](#) - a project to give portable scanning kits worth \$500 to qualified Indiana non-profit groups:

FLOYD COUNTY

The New Albany-Floyd County Public Library hosted an [event](#) to discuss the impact of the Division Street School in New Albany. The state's second oldest school for African-American students, it was a high school from 1885 through 1946.

HUNTINGTON COUNTY

Demolition crews working on a vinyl-sided house in Markle discovered there was a log cabin [hiding](#) inside its walls, one that had been built in 1835 by Albert Draper. The Markle Historical Society, in conjunction with Indiana Landmarks, saved the log cabin from demolition and recently had it moved to Mill Park.

LAPORTE COUNTY

The LaPorte County Public Library has [digitized](#) their yearbook collection for area high schools, including LaPorte, Michigan City and Rolling Prairie. The digital yearbooks are available on the library's new [digital collections](#) website.

MIAMI COUNTY

Parts of downtown Converse have recently been [added](#) to the National Register of Historic Places. The 5 blocks in the designation include a house built in 1865 and an Odd Fellows lodge built in 1879.

PORTER COUNTY

The [Larry J. Clark Genealogy Center](#) at the Valparaiso Public Library will hold their first-ever Genealogy Day on Saturday, March 18 beginning at 10 am. Please register by calling (219) 462-0524 extension 5.

- From 10 am to 3:30 pm, there will be a genealogy book sale, with the library selling their extra copies of genealogy indexes, CDs and yearbooks so they can make room for more items.
- From 1 to 2:30 pm, Marlene Polster will give a presentation on "Hitting the Stacks" - for ancestors that you can't find online, learn how the library's collection can help.
- Beginning at 5 pm, there will be a research lock-in (you must be in the library by 4 pm) - staff will be available for individual help and there will be door prizes.

--[Hoosier State Chronicles](#), the Indiana State Library's free site for digitized newspapers, recently added scattered issues from the Richmond *Weekly Palladium* (1875) and the Richmond *Daily Palladium* for 1898-1902 and 1904-1907. These issues were digitized with the support of the Wayne County Foundation, in cooperation with the Morrison-Reeves Library in Richmond.

--Mary Lou Griffey has [written](#) a 300-page book about the glory days of area basketball, *The Goal, The Towns, The Teams, The Times*. It details how before 1963 (when state law consolidated the schools), the county enjoyed 12 high school basketball teams. --A Richmond newspaper [article](#) has items that were making headlines in 1877, including a baby boy left on a childless couple's doorstep.

Ancestry.com adds Presbyterian Church records database

Ancestry.com recently added a database, [U.S., Presbyterian Records, 1743-1970](#), which contains Presbyterian Church registers (baptisms, marriages & burials) for parts of 38 states. For Indiana, this database includes Blackford County (Hartford City) and Grant County (Marion). This database comes from the records of the Presbyterian Historical Society in Philadelphia.

Legal terms explained: Moiety

Moiety comes from Latin, and it means "half" or "a part". This term is usually used in reference to inheritance and an heir's share of an estate or share of a piece of land.



However, this term has also been used historically in criminal law to define the monetary benefits that may be given to informants - such as receiving part of a fine paid by a person who is convicted of the crime they informed on.

Research Tip: Digitized books on Library of Congress' website

The Library of Congress' website has some great [digital collections](#), including:

- [Chronicling America](#) (digital images of United States newspapers from 1789-1924)
- [Historical plat maps](#) (plat maps show who owned a piece of land and who all the neighbors were)
- [Sanborn fire insurance maps](#) (these are maps of a town's buildings, created to help insurance companies assess risk)
